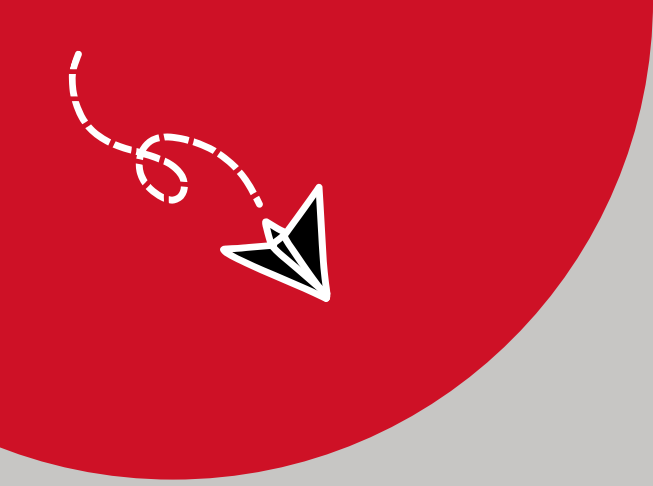
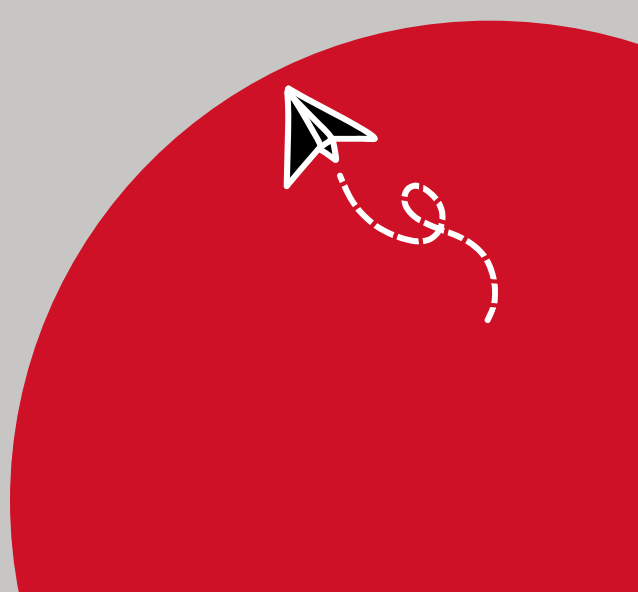
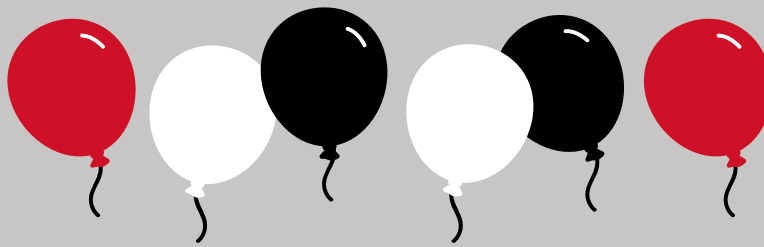

Over the past five semesters, we've laughed, we've learned, and we have built community. You are the first cohort I've been able to see from application to final classes in person! Saying our farewells in EAF 413 with the majority of you standing around our circle is a memory that will always stay with me. I am so hopeful for the future of higher education administration with educators such as you entering into the guild.

We all belong to the guild of student affairs. A guild can be defined as "an association of people for mutual aid or the pursuit of a common goal". This speaks to me deeply, as many of us recently read Dean Spade's 2020 book *Mutual Aid: Building Solidarity During This Crisis (and the next)* which was your last assignment for me, to describe what the concept of mutual aid could look like in higher education and/or student affairs. I am thankful for all you have taught me over these two past years, and if you ever learned anything from me, I hope that you pass that forward to the next generation of student affairs killjoys. Dr. Phyllis Retires



"I joined the Illinois State University faculty in 1999, will be retiring in August 2022. I started as an Assistant Professor and Coordinator of the CSPA master's program after an 18 year career in student affairs at Western Illinois University, Syracuse University, Indiana University of Pennsylvania, and Florida State University. My master's degree was earned at Western Illinois in College Student Personnel and my doctorate in Higher Education Administration from Florida State. I "found" student affairs while serving as a Resident Assistant (RA) at Western and was "invited in" to the field by Julie Kheener, the assistant hall director who was studying CSP at Western and who asked if I had ever considered a career in housing/residence life. That began a 41 year journey that has been more positive than I ever imagined!"

"As the only full-time faculty in the CSPA program until Gavin's arrival in 2017, I was responsible for the development of the program curriculum and all the core courses (with support from many EAF faculty like Dr. Ed Hines, Dr. Jim Palmer, Dr. Trisha Klass, Dr. Wendy Troxel, Dr. Lydia Kyei-Blankson, and Dr. Mohamed Nur-Awaleh) and CSPA as a stand-alone degree (rather than a concentration in EAF); expanding on the GRAD Days program (created by Dr. Jeff Waple); developing a recruitment plan and coordinating admissions (led by Dr. Marcia Hickrod); building relationships with student affairs staff on campus and at local campuses in the region to expand assistantship and practicum opportunities (with much assistance from Dr. Vic Boschini, Dr. Helen Mamarchev, Dr. Larry Dietz, Dr. Brent Paterson, Dr. Jan Paterson, and Dr. Levester Johnson); oversaw the creation of the Gamsky Fellowship (thanks to a generous donation from Dr. Neal and Mrs. Irene Gamsky); introduced the idea of a hooding ceremony, alumni newsletter, and summer alumni institute (with assistance from all the Gamsky Fellows since 2006); initiated the student organization CSPAG (now called SAGA...with lots of great student leadership through the years); coordinated social events (mostly held at Dr. Marcia's home!) to mark the beginning and the end of the academic year as well as commencement and even class snack breaks; sought donations, and scholarships in support of the program (led by Dr. Gail Lamb, Liz Adams, and Wilma Bates); and led efforts in program assessment (with Dr. Marcia and Dr. Jan Paterson)."

"It has been such a joy to see the success that our students have achieved over the past 25+ years that CSPA has been in existence and how far the program has developed with the support of our amazing alums!! Onward CSPA to better and more important future accomplishments with Dr. Gavin Weiser and Dr. Marci Rockey leading the way!!

"Hello to my fellow Redbirds! I am so excited to be returning to Illinois State University to support students in the CSPA program. As some of you know, I completed my undergraduate degree as a Mass Communication major at Illinois State before coming into the program myself. My experiences as a summer Preview Guide introduced me to the field of Student Affairs, but it took me a few years to find my way to CSPA. As a graduate student, I had assistantships in what was then the Office of Student Life and completed practicum experiences at Illinois Wesleyan University and with Dr. Phyllis to coordinate our delegation to the Oshkosh Placement Exchange."

"Much to my surprise, my career began in the community college sector when I was hired as the Director of Student Life at Lincoln Land Community College-and I absolutely loved it. After eight years there, I moved into the role of the Director of Student Engagement at Richland Community College. At that point, I was anxious to get back into the classroom and was accepted into the doctoral program at the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign with a Research Assistantship at the Office of Community College Research and Leadership (OCCRL). As I went through my coursework, supporting rural students in higher education became the centerpiece of my dissertation research. OCCRL has remained my professional home for the last seven years providing me with tremendous opportunities to support both state and national projects to advance equity in community colleges, particularly for racially minoritized students."

"On a personal level, I have always lived and worked in central Illinois. As a rural student myself, I navigated the transition from a high school of 120 students to Illinois State University. I met my husband at ISU (also a former Preview Guide) and we have three children, Jillian (14), Eli (12), and Thomas (9). We also have a lovable Labrador Retriever named Scout, a guinea pig, and a frog. I enjoy taking walks with Scout, reading books, and listening to podcasts about books."

"I am excited to return to the place where my own higher education journey started and the program that has offered me so much support and mentorship throughout my career. I am most looking forward to meeting current CSPA students and being a part of the program's coordination team!"

"The first year was tough. My GA and classes were both completely online so by second semester I was feeling pretty isolated. I definitely valued getting the chance to socialize with others in the program during this time. My summer practicum at Brown University was completely in-person and I got to work with 50 other graduate students while I was there. It was so refreshing and exactly what I needed!



I was more than ready for the in-person experience back at ISU and it has felt great. It's still an adjustment because online classes have seemed to make me less motivated, so it's hard to get that back. 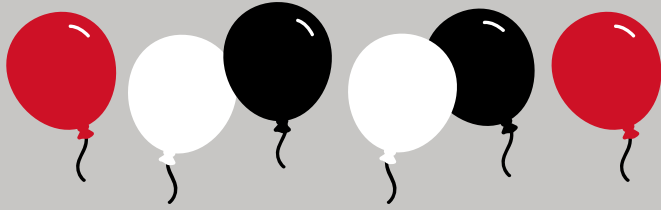
ACPA REFLECTION

SECOND YEAR: DANIEL DRISCOLL



"ACPA '22 was the first conference I have ever attended, and I am so grateful for the opportunity to travel to St. Louis and meet so many talented professionals. My favorite session was "Navigating Your First Job Search", by Connor J Terry. Terry's presentation focused on the reality of job searching within higher education and what we should expect. Although the response rate and the outlook for the number of interviews seemed bleak, it helped everyone realize that their struggles with finding a job are not unique. Terry ended the session with this piece of advice, "do not take a job because it seems like you will never get a job...you will get a job and it is up to you to decide what the right position is". It was very comforting to hear that I will get a job and I will have the power to decide my own fate, when at times, it feels like I have no control. And I am happy to say that I received an academic advising position at Illinois State University shortly after ACPA concluded."





ACPA REFLECTION

FIRST YEAR: JALYN JONES



"For my Spring Break I had the opportunity to attend the ACPA conference. This was my first professional development conference, and it was a wonderful experience. The conference took place in St. Louis, and we were there for about three days. What I appreciated about this conference was the dedication that was made to educate on the lives of the indigenous in the area and pay respect to these indigenous communities, that went beyond a land acknowledgement. There were wonderful speakers throughout the event that spoke freely about their identity and how that informs the work they do in student affairs. Before going I thought ACPA, would just be a group of professionals coming together to rave about the field of student affairs, but it was much more honest. Practitioners spoke about the challenges they face and gave insight into why so many are leaving the field. While these are not things I wanted to hear as someone coming to the field, I appreciated that for those who love this work they are not afraid to critique it and admit higher education has a long way to go before it is a field that retains its professionals. When it comes to sessions, I really tried to branch out and learn about topics that I had very little knowledge about. My favorite sessions were on the topics of supporting students who engage in sex work, fatphobia in student affairs, and how graphic novels can be used as a tool to teach leadership. These sessions gave me perspective on the challenges that groups of students, who I have not thought of, must face. These sessions also led to me doing self-reflection and identifying ways I can not only be a better mentor to students, but colleague. All in all, I am so grateful I had the chance to attend and hope I can do so next year."

SECOND YEAR: OLIVIA ROSS

"During my time at NASPA, I attended a session, "25+ Years and Still Going Strong: Building a Sustainable Career in Student Affairs," which I enjoyed and found impactful. The presenters for this session, all Student Affairs professionals who have worked in the field for 25 years or more, discussed the Great Resignation in Student Affairs; Student Affairs professionals have been leaving the field in waves over the last few years. The panel of presenters encouraged audience members to consider why so many people are leaving the field, and we came up with a list of possible reasons: burnout, low compensation, and a lack of work-life balance. The ideas I took away from this session were how to adapt to changes in the field and to reach out to trusted colleagues for guidance and support when you are struggling. This session was incredibly impactful because it helped me realize that I might experience some really difficult years during my Student Affairs career that make me consider leaving the field. However, if I remain open-minded and adaptable, reach out to colleagues and friends for support, and remember who I do the work for (my students), I will hopefully be able to get through those difficult times."



"In addition to the "25+ Years and Still Going Strong" session, my favorite parts of the conference were forming stronger connections with my peers, trying new things, and traveling to new places. More specifically, I had never been to Baltimore prior to this trip. It was an exciting experience navigating a brand new place, trying new foods (and some old foods, I'm looking at you, Cheesecake Factory), and spending a good amount of time on planes, trains, and in Ubers with my friends. I also had a fun time exploring Washington, D.C. with my fellow CSPA grad students. Overall, I had a wonderful experience at NASPA!"
